

From the Sports Desk with John Loven From First Kick to Final Whistle: Castleberry Lions' **Unforgettable Road to the State Final**

The 2025 Castleberry High School boys' soccer team's season giant. In fact, CHS had not given up a single goal in the first five ended on Thursday, April 10. This special season began with great playoff games (winning by the scores of 5-0, 4-0, 3-0, 2-0, and 2promise, led by an experienced group of coaches and players. The team jumped out to a fast start this year going 5-0-2 in their first seven games. Then, on Jan. 22nd they suffered their first loss of the season to rival Diamond Hill. The Lions proceeded to go 17-0-1 over the next 18 games. This brought them to the final stage, the 4A Division 1 State Soccer Championship. The Dream was now within their grasp.

During this historic playoff run, the Lions had been a defensive



0). They came into the state championship against Salado with a record of 22-1-3. The Eagles came in 23-3-3, having won their semi-final game by forfeit over Progresso.

The championship game was played in Georgetown at Birkelbach Field and the stands were full of hundreds of faithful Lion fans who made the three-hour drive down I-35 for the 6:30 p.m. game.

The Lions struck quickly, scoring a goal within the first 5 minutes of the match. Senior Christian Serrato had a free kick from about 20 yards out that got past the Salado goalie and found the left corner of the net. At the 35:42-mark CHS led 1-0. Seniors Ethan Padilla and Jose Chairez ater got shots on goal but did not score. At the 27:40 mark of the first half something happened that had not occurred during the CHS playoff run, a goal was scored on them. The Eagles tied the game 1-1.

For the next 20 minutes Salado controlled the tempo of the game, keeping the Lions mostly playing defense. The Eagles managed five more kicks on goal, but none scored, thanks to a great diving play by junior goalie Caleb Castaneda The last 7 minutes of the first half saw the Lions regain the momentum. They got five shots on goal. With just 1:47 left until halftime Chairez floated a kick over the Salado goalie into the net to give the Lions a 2-1 lead which remained through halftime. Regular trash routes will not be picked up on April 18.

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
From the Tarrant County Department of Human Services Financial Assistance Options in Tarrant County

Tarrant County Department of Human Services (TCDHS) is the County's temporary financial assistance program. Financial assistance is provided to eligible households for rent, mortgage, utilities, food and hygiene items, and transportation on a limited basis. To qualify for rental and utility assistance the following criteria must be met: resides in Tarrant County, demonstrates the ability to maintain housing with one-time assistance, income does not exceed 185 percent of the Federal Poverty Level, and the landlord must be willing to agree for the tenant to stay for a minimum of three additional months.

From the City of River Oaks **River Oaks City Council Candidate Application Period** to Begin in July

New legislation passed for home rule, where city manager and city council ruled cities have the option by Resolution to move their general election dates to November of each year, instead of May.

The River Oaks City Council adopted Resolution 1126-2024 on June 18, 2024, changing the date on which the city holds its general election for officers to the November uniform election date, pursuant to section 41.0052 of the Texas Election Code. In the Nov. 4, 2025 General Election, Council places 1 and 3 will on the Ballot.

The first day to apply for a place on the General Election ballot will be July 19, 2025 (dates are subject to change from the 2025 legislation).

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Suburban Newspapers, Inc. Texas History Minute by Dr. Ken Bridges From Hill Country to High Command: How Texan Chester Nimitz Led the U.S. Navy to Victory in WWII

Chester Nimitz was a Texan ready to serve his country in its darkest days. Through clever planning and fearless determination, Nimitz led naval forces in the Pacific to victory in World War II.

Chester William Nimitz was born in Fredericksburg in 1885 and had a childhood far from the sea. His father died just before he was born, and he was raised by his mother and paternal grandfather, Charles Nimitz. The elder Nimitz was a German immigrant and had been a sailor before he settled in Texas in the 1850s. He also had served as a captain in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. He had a profound impact on the younger Nimitz.

As he reached adulthood, he wanted to serve his country and applied for admission to the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. His congressman convinced him to apply to the U. S. Naval Academy, where he graduated seventh in his class in 1905. He served with distinctions on a number of battleships and destroyers after his graduation, mostly serving in the Pacific fleet. In 1909, he was assigned to serve with the navy's first submarine fleet and helped with the construction of the ships and training of the earliest crews.

During World War I, he served as chief engineer on a destroyer and later served as an aide to Adm. Samuel Robison, commander of the Atlantic submarine fleet. After the war, he was given his first command, the cruiser USS Chicago. In 1926, he established the navy's first ROTC program to ensure a steady supply of reliable, educated officers for the navy. He steadily rose through the ranks, respected for his dedication and his imagination in modernizing engine designs, submarine construction, and even mid-ocean refueling techniques.

On Dec. 17, 1941, ten days after the disastrous attack on the

Pacific fleet at Pearl Harbor, President Franklin D. Roosevelt named Nimitz commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet. The fleet was in shambles, and Nimitz was responsible for holding back the tide of the Japanese navy threatening American shores.

He quickly rallied American ships to stop the Japanese advance on Australia with the Battle of the Coral Sea in 1942. Learning that Japan was trying to finish off the navy, he organized a massive fleet to meet the Japanese at Midway that June. Midway was a tremendous victory for America, allowing the U. S. to recapture the Central Pacific. Japanese officials realized they had lost the war at that point but fought on.

Nimitz organized the "island-hopping" campaigns of the South Pacific as American forces fought to liberate key island groups. His tactics at the Battle of Leyte Gulf in 1944 broke the back of the remaining Japanese navy and led to the recapture of the Philippines. When Japan finally surrendered in 1945, Nimitz was on the USS Missouri to accept their capitulation.

After the war, Nimitz was named Chief of Naval Operations and oversaw the dismantling of the massive fleet the nation had built during the war. At the same time, he pushed for modernization of the fleet as oversaw the construction of the submarine USS Nautilus, the first nuclear-powered naval vessel. He retired from his duties as chief of naval operations in 1947, but his status as a fleet admiral kept him on active duty. He served as a Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Navy, advising the navy on special issues. He also served as a regent for the University of California system during the 1950s.

He died at his home in California in 1966. The nation revered the great hero after his passing. Eight communities named schools after him, including a high school in Irving and an elementary school in Kerrville. In 1971, his hometown of Fredericksburg honored him by opening the Chester Nimitz Museum which has since expanded into the National Museum of the Pacific War.

In 1975, the navy commissioned the USS Nimitz, a top-of-theline nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, a vessel still serving to this day.
