## Boys Soccer Notches Another Victory



For the second game in a row the Castleberry High School boys soccer team faced a team with another very impressive record.

The Lions were playing at home in the confines of W.O. Barnes Stadium on Tuesday, Jan. 28. They faced Life Waxahachie, who entered the game sporting a great 10-1-2 record. Both teams had one common opponent, Midlothian Heritage, who they both beat by the same score of 1-0. Another tough-looking game for our Lions, especially considering both teams were ranked among the top squads in the state. The Lions and the Mustangs played to a 0-0 tie in the first half. About halfway through the second half the Lions scored a goal. That goal would prove to be enough as the Lions went on to shut out the Mustangs and win 1-0.

The game began as a defensive battle. During the first 15 minutes each team managed to get just a couple of kicks on goal. At the 24:10 mark the Mustangs missed a great opportunity. A corner kick by the Mustangs resulted in several kicks and ricochets right in front of the CHS goal. But

good defense and goalie play by Caleb Castaneda turned the Mustangs away empty handed. That was the last time the Mustangs got anywhere near scoring in the first half. Meanwhile, Lions Ethan Padilla, Jose Chairez, Christian Serrato and Tony Herrera all managed to get shots on goal, but none scored. The teams ended the first half tied 0-0.

The second half was controlled by the Lions. Serrato and Chairez again managed some kicks on goal, but could not quite squeeze one inside of the net. That ended for the Lions at the 21:32 mark. A corner kick ended in an assist by Padilla and a goal for Sebastian Garcia. His goal put CHS up 1-0. The Lions had a few more scoring opportunities, including a shot by Uriel Peireyra. However, the Lions did not score again, but that was enough as they played great defense. They limited the Mustangs to only two more weak shots on goal. The Lions made the 1-0 lead last until the end of the game for their seventh victory of the season.

The Lions will travel to Springtown on Friday, Feb. 7. Go Lions!

## First Responders to Teach CPR Skills at Fort Worth Libraries



Thirteen Fort Worth Public Library locations will host hands-only CPR and AED training taught by Fort Worth Fire Department staff in February, which is American Heart Month.

The free classes are designed for teens and adults and are available on a first-come, first-served basis; no registration is required. Instruction is focused on hands-only CPR and AED use and is not a certification course.

“Knowing how to perform hands-only CPR and use life-saving tools like AEDs can make a difference in the critical minutes before first responders arrive,” said Fire Chief Jim Davis. “I’m proud we are offering this type of training to the public at no cost.”

According to the American Heart Association, immediate CPR is proven to double or triple the chances of survival after cardiac ar-

rest. Timely and accurate AED use can also improve survival rates.

# Romance Scams: Senior Citizens are Particularly Vulnerable

Romance scams are at an all-time high and, while victims cross all demographics, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) reports that elders are increasingly targeted. Why? Because they often have retirement savings at their disposal and may be more isolated and less tech savvy.

“Romance scammers often manipulate emotions to gain trust,” says Mark Kwapiszeski, head of enterprise fraud for PNC.

Scammers will create convincing profiles on dating and social media apps, reaching out to their target feigning familiarity or attraction. Things move quickly, but there is always a reason they can't meet on video or in person. They tell their target everything they want to hear, and the hook is set.

Suddenly, a crisis arises that they insist they need help financial help with to mitigate. Or maybe they need finances to set up a new life together. They ask for the money, but would prefer it be sent in a form like cryptocurrency or gift card where there is little chance of the victim ever recovering it.

To add insult to injury, scammers may convince their target to send them revealing photos they will later use to extort them. They may even play the long game and build trust over time, then convince their target to invest with them, without the victim ever getting any return.

“A romance scammer can invest a long time in cultivating trust, which makes these scams particularly nefarious,” Kwapiszeski says.

To protect against potential romance scams, follow these tips:

- Before sending money or sharing financial information, consult a friend or family member. Simply talking to someone not involved in the situation is often enough to identify red flags.

- Trust your gut. If something seems too good to be true, it probably is.

- Beware of “love bombing,” when a person lavishes you with excessive flattery, affection and praise early in the relationship to manipulate your emotions.

- Be wary of strangers reaching out on social media.

- If you like someone, ask for a quick video chat. If they refuse or make up outlandish excuses, that's a red flag.

- Stay alert to photos or biographical details that don't match up with what someone's told you.

- Use image and name-reverse searches to validate the identity of people you meet online.

- Never send intimate photos to strangers or invest without doing your due diligence.

- Confide in family and friends if you grow suspicious.

Elders have lost homes, emptied out retirement accounts and risked lifetime savings for a love interest that never truly existed. Once the shock abates and the money is gone, the shame sets in and some have even resorted to self-harm instead of admitting to being defrauded in this way. If a loved one falls victim to a romance scam, it's important to respond with empathy.

The best line of defense against romance scams is awareness. Understanding common tactics can help you stay protected.

## War Leader of the Kwahadi Band - Quanah Parker



Quanah Parker became a respected leader of the Comanche Nation at the end of the Plains Indian Wars. He spent much of his life caught between two worlds. He was the son of a white settler and a Comanche chief. And he had to lead his tribe in the difficult transition from their ancient traditions to life on the reservation.

His mother, Cynthia Ann Parker, was captured by Comanches at age nine in an 1836 raid on Fort Parker in Central Texas, just east of modern-day Waco. She became a full-fledged member of the tribe and fully assimilated into the culture. She married Peta Nocona, the chief of the Kwahadi band of Comanches. The community of Nocona was later named for him. Quanah Parker was born probably in 1845 in the Wichita Mountains of southern Oklahoma, though other dates have been offered and even locations as distant as East Texas as the site of his birth.

Parker grew up with Comanche traditions on the Llano Estacado, moving along sites across the Texas Panhandle and into New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas. In 1860, his

mother and sister were captured in a clash with Texas Rangers at the Battle of Pease River in Foard County and died within a few years. Though Comanche tradition encouraged tribe members to change their birth names once they reached adulthood, Parker kept his birth name as a reminder of his mother.

In 1868, the federal government attempted to make peace with the tribes of the southern plains and bring them onto reservations. Many tribes signed, but Parker refused. The army sent cavalry units after the Comanches, but the tribe always managed to stay a step ahead. Parker would even raid cavalry camps, steal army horses, and disappear. By 1872, the army gave up its search. In 1874, the army restarted its search for the Comanches and waged intense battles against them.

At the end of the Red River War in 1875, Parker had to face the terrible reality. The U. S. Army had killed 1,500 of their horses at the Battle of Palo Duro Canyon, and the buffalo that the Comanches and other tribes relied upon had been hunted nearly to extinction. With their maneuverability and military strength greatly reduced and with food becoming scarce, Parker had no choice but to surrender his band of Comanches to the army, becoming the last tribe on the southern plains to surrender. They were taken to the combined Kiowa-Apache-Comanche reservation in the Southwest Indian Territory, or what is now Oklahoma.

Though he was chief of his own band of Kwahadi Comanches, the federal government made him principal chief of all Comanches though the tribe had not selected him for the position. Nevertheless, he spoke out repeatedly to defend Comanche needs, their rights, and their traditions. He tried to make the Comanches self-sufficient on the reservations and encouraged the construction of schools on the reservations that emphasized their cultural heritage. There was tremendous pressures to open reservation lands to white settlers and to lease the lands for grazing rights, but Parker resisted. By the 1880s, after years of discussions and negotiations, he entered into a contract with North

Texas cattle barons Charles Goodnight and Samuel Burk Burnett to allow their cattle to graze on one million acres of their reservation lands for a fee. The contract stayed in place until 1902, and the grazing fees became a steady source of income for the tribes. Parker himself also made the transition to becoming a successful rancher himself, and with investments in railroads became perhaps the wealthiest Native American in the country.

Parker earned a great deal of respect among white settlers in his later years. In 1884, the city of Quanah, the county seat of Hardeman County, was founded and named after Parker. He even appeared at a dedication ceremony, offering a benediction to bless the community, saying, "May the Great Spirit smile upon your little town." He met regularly with many powerful politicians, including President Theodore Roosevelt. In 1902, he was named Deputy Sheriff for Lawton.

At a time when federal and state officials were trying to end tribal religious practices in favor of Christianity, Parker maintained his steadfast support for his ancient traditions. He became a co-founder and leader of what became known as the Native American Church, sometimes called Peyotism, which was a combination of different tribal traditions culmination in the belief that the world was controlled by the creator, or "Great Spirit," and emphasized care for others, forgiveness, and unity. Peyote is commonly used as a medicine and for spiritual visions. In 1907, he defended the use of peyote in religious ceremonies at a committee meeting of the Oklahoma state legislature, declaring, "I do not think this legislature should interfere with a man's religion." One of his sons, however, would become a noted Methodist minister.

Parker continued to give interviews and travel to other reservations.

He died at his home in Cache in 1911. He was buried next to his mother. The reservation government was reorganized after his death, replacing chief with the position of chairman, making Quanah Parker at the time the last chief of the Comanches.


