## River Oaks Launches New Phone Payment System for Utility Bills and Tickets

Residents in River Oaks now have a new way to pay city utility bills and municipal tickets without visiting City Hall.

The city has introduced an Interactive Voice Response (IVR) payment system that allows customers to make payments by phone. By dialing 877-883-3752, residents can follow automated prompts to complete transactions quickly and securely using a debit or credit card. The system provides step-by-step instructions to guide users through the process and also allows customers to hear real-time account balances and due dates before making a payment.

The IVR system eliminates the need to wait in line and provides another option alongside traditional in-person or online payments.

Residents should note that a convenience fee of 3.7 percent applies to payments made through the phone system. Despite the added fee, city staff say the service offers a quick and simple alternative for customers looking for an easy way to stay current on utility bills and municipal fines.

Residents interested in using the new service can call 877-883-3752 to make a payment or check their account balance.

## **CRUD Mobile to Collect Household Chemicals April 18**

River Oaks residents will have an opportunity to safely dispose of household chemical waste when the City of Fort Worth's CRUD Mobile visits City Hall.

The mobile collection unit will be set up in the City Hall parking lot from 9 to 11 a.m. Saturday, April 18, 2026, to accept unwanted household chemicals free of charge from residents of Fort Worth and participating cities.

The CRUD Mobile is an extension of Fort Worth's Environmental Collection Center and accepts a wide range of materials, including paint and stains, motor oil, antifreeze, batteries, fertilizers, pesticides, pool chemicals, solvents, fluorescent light bulbs, pharmaceuticals and other household chemicals.

Items that will not be accepted include ammunition, asbestos, building materials, electronics, explosives, medical waste, propane or butane cylinders, tires, televisions, smoke detectors and radioactive materials.

Residents are asked to bring a recent water bill as proof of residency and to keep chemicals in their original containers whenever possible. Liquid paint should be sorted by type before arrival. Chemicals should be transported in the trunk of the vehicle rather than the passenger compartment.

## **River Oaks Spring Clean Up Month Set for April**

Residents will have the opportunity throughout April to declutter their homes and properties as part of the City of River Oaks' annual Spring Clean Up Month.

From April 1 through April 30, the city will collect a wide range of unwanted items placed at the curb on residents' regular trash and bulk pickup days. City officials are encouraging homeowners to take advantage of the program to clear out garages, yards and storage areas as warmer weather sets in.

During Clean Up Month, crews will collect tree limbs, brush, logs, debris, junk, garbage and general household trash placed at the curb. The initiative is designed to help residents dispose of items that may not fit in regular trash bins while improving neighborhood appearance and safety.

Residents are reminded to place all items at the curb on their normal trash and bulk collection day to ensure pickup. Items should be organized neatly to allow crews safe and efficient access.

## **Citywide Yard Sale March 27–29**

River Oaks residents will have the opportunity to buy, sell and browse during the city's annual Citywide Yard Sale, scheduled for March 27–29, weather permitting.

This event is free and no permit is required. Residents who wish to be included on the official Yard Sale List must register their address at City Hall no later than 4 p.m. March 19. The list will be published on the city's Facebook page, in the city newsletter and on the city website the week before the event. Participants who register by the deadline will receive two free yard sale signs from City Hall. Personal signs are allowed but may only be displayed on the seller's own property.

According to city ordinance, participants must be listed on the water account for the property and provide a valid ID with a matching address when registering. Signs may not be placed on boulevards, street signs, stop signs, utility poles or any structure owned by the city. All yard sale signs must be removed within 24 hours after the event concludes.

City officials encourage residents planning to participate to register early to ensure inclusion on the published list and to pick up their free signs before the deadline.

## **City to Offer Free Tire Pickup to Reduce Mosquito Breeding**

City officials are urging residents to clear out discarded tires to help reduce mosquito breeding as warmer weather approaches.

Discarded tires left in yards can collect standing water, creating an ideal environment for mosquitoes to lay eggs. To address the issue, the city is offering free tire collection for residential customers now through April 30, 2026.

Residents may place up to four used tires at the curb on their regular Wednesday bulk collection day. The city will collect and dispose of the tires at no charge during the limited-time program.

Households with more than four tires to discard are asked to contact the Public Works Department to schedule a special pickup by calling 817-626-5421, ext. 332. Residents also may call to request pickup service. Otherwise, Public Works crews will collect tires placed at the curb on bulk collection day.

The free collection service is available to residential customers only. The city will not collect tires from businesses, as commercial waste disposal is handled through a contracted commercial hauler.

## Advancing Bicycle Safety

### Across North Texas

From children riding to school to adults staying active or commuting to work, bicycling is both great exercise and an accessible mode of transportation for many North Texans.

Safe bicycle infrastructure and proper attentiveness while riding and driving are key components of traffic safety.

The Look Out Texans safety campaign urges everyone to be alert, and Look Out for one another, to keep bicyclists safe.

In Texas, a bicycle is considered a vehicle when it is operated on the road.

For this reason, bicyclists are required to follow the same traffic laws as vehicle drivers.

Most crashes between vehicles and bicyclists happen because drivers fail to see the cyclist.

The following are some tips for staying visible while cycling:

- **Follow traffic laws.** Bicyclists are responsible for obeying traffic laws, including stopping at stop signs and traffic signals, and yielding the right-of-way to pedestrians.

- **Proper lighting is required by law.** Affix a white front light and red rear light and reflectors to the bicycle for nighttime riding or when visibility is poor.

- **Place yourself in the traffic lane so you are noticed by motorists.** Be alert and claim your space at intersections. Continually scan the road, and do not assume drivers see you. Ride predictably, so drivers will know where you are heading and are more likely to see you.

- **Protect your head from severe injuries.** Always wear a properly fitted bike helmet while cycling. A helmet reduces the risk of death or serious injury, with studies showing significantly reduced risk of brain injuries by up to nearly 90 percent.

- **Dress to be seen by motorists.** Wear bright/light-colored clothing and reflective materials. Drivers can see reflective materials three times farther away.

Why It Matters:

Understanding how drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians interact on our roadways is crucial for the safety of all North Texans: our families, friends and neighbors. Looking out for one another can make all the difference in reducing crashes and saving lives.

## Tarrant County Invites

### Residents to Apply for

## Citizen Prosecutor Academy

Residents interested in learning how the criminal justice system operates in Tarrant County will soon have an opportunity to go behind the scenes through the Citizen Prosecutor Academy.

Hosted by the Tarrant County Criminal District Attorney's Office, the program gives community members an in-depth look at how criminal cases move through the local justice system, from investigation to prosecution.

While the spring session of the academy is already underway, applications are now being accepted for the fall class, which will run from Sept. 3 through Nov. 12.

The free program meets Thursdays from 6 to 8 p.m. and is designed to give participants a better understanding of the work performed by prosecutors, investigators and other members of the criminal justice system.

Classes are taught by assistant district attorneys and investigators from the district attorney's office, who guide participants through the steps involved in building and prosecuting criminal cases. Topics often include how cases are investigated, how prosecutors evaluate evidence and how cases proceed through the court system.

Participants will also have the opportunity to tour the Tarrant County Corrections Center, offering a closer look at the county jail and its role within the criminal justice process.

Program organizers say the academy is intended to help residents better understand how the justice system functions while strengthening connections between the district attorney's office and the community it serves.

# Tarrant County Program Offers Home Repair Assistance

For homeowners struggling with costly repairs or accessibility challenges, a Tarrant County assistance program is offering a path to safer, more livable housing at little to no cost for those who qualify.

Funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the county's Homeowner Assistance Program is designed to help residents address major home repair needs, improve accessibility and, in some cases, reconstruct aging or unsafe homes.

The program is available to qualifying homeowners living in Tarrant County, though it excludes residents within the cities of Arlington, Fort Worth and Grand Prairie. Officials say the initiative is aimed at helping residents in smaller communities and unincorporated areas maintain safe and stable housing.

The program focuses on a range of housing issues that can impact a homeowner's safety and quality of life. Assistance may be available for major system failures such as plumbing, electrical or roofing problems, as well as smaller but urgent repairs like replacing water heaters, upgrad-

ing electrical panels or fixing heating and air conditioning systems.

In addition to repairs, the program also supports accessibility improvements for residents with mobility challenges. Eligible homeowners may receive help installing wheelchair ramps, widening doorways, adding accessible hardware or installing grab bars in bathrooms.

The initiative includes three primary program tracks: home rehabilitation, priority reconstruction and ADA barrier removal. Each is tailored to different levels of need, ranging from targeted repairs to more extensive structural work.

To be eligible, homeowners must meet several requirements related to residency, income and property status.

Applicants must have owned and lived in their home for at least one year and must have clear title to the property. Reverse mortgages are not permitted under the program, and the title must be in the applicant's name. Homeowners must also be current on both property taxes and mortgage payments.

In addition, applicants must meet at least one of several household criteria. Eligible participants include those receiving Social Security Disability Insurance or Supplemental Security Income, individuals age 62 or older, or households with dependent children under the age of 18 living at home.

Income limits also apply and are based on the total number of people living in the household. According to the chart provided in the program flyer, a single-person household must have an annual income below \$59,750, while a household of four must be below \$85,350. Larger households have higher limits, up to \$112,700 for a household of eight. These limits are effective as of July 2025.

The program also includes guidelines related to the property itself. Homes must be valued under \$309,000 to qualify for assistance.

Certain property types are not eligible for the program. These include mobile homes, duplexes, homes located in flood zones and properties with more than two liens.

Officials say these restrictions are intended to ensure that funding is directed toward eligible single-family homes where assistance can have the greatest long-term impact.

The Homeowner Assistance Program is part of a broader effort by Tarrant County Community Development to improve housing conditions and help residents remain in their homes as they age or face financial challenges. By addressing both structural repairs and accessibility needs, the program aims to reduce safety risks while supporting long-term housing stability. For many homeowners, particularly seniors and individuals with disabilities, the ability to make necessary repairs can mean the difference between staying in their home and being forced to relocate.

County officials encourage residents who may qualify to reach out, even if they are unsure about their eligibility. Residents interested in applying or learning more about the program can contact [Tarrant County Community Development](#) by calling 817-850-7940 and selecting option 4.

Staff members can help determine eligibility, explain program options and guide applicants through the process. As housing costs and maintenance expenses continue to rise, programs like this one offer a critical lifeline for homeowners seeking to preserve their properties and maintain safe, functional living environments.

# UT Alum Gail Davis Rode to Fame as TV's Annie Oakley

In the days when westerns dominated the new invention of television, one Texas actress charmed audiences across the nation with her colorful portrayals.

Gail Davis, once called by longtime friend Gene Autry "the perfect western actress," was a familiar face on television and film in the 1950s.

Born Betty Jeane Grayson in Little



Rock, Arkansas, in 1925 to a physician. She spent several years living in McGehee, a small town to the south, where her father helped build a hospital before moving to Little Rock for the remainder of her childhood.

As a youngster, she loved performing in front of audiences and was a gifted singer. The future star was also very athletic, taking up swimming and tennis and became an expert horse rider. She competed in a number of rodeos, including becoming a trick shot expert. She would graduate from Little Rock High School and went on to the University of Texas at Austin (UT) where she studied dance and drama.

She enrolled at the UT during World War II. She was very active in the drama clubs. She and other students would perform for troops at shows at nearby bases across Central Texas. It was at one of these shows where she happened to meet Gene Autry, already a popular western singer and actor, who was serving in the Army Air Force at the time. Autry was impressed and encouraged her to come to California to make a try at performing. It was also at UT that she met and married her first husband, Bob Davis, and eventually had a daughter.

After her graduation in 1946, the three went to California where she earned a contract with MGM studios. Davis recounted that the studio could not have another "Betty Davis" as an actress with the studio, and a stage hand suggested the name Gail.

She soon made a few appearances in westerns, including *The Far Frontier* with Roy Rogers in 1948. She reconnected with Gene Autry, and he took her under his wing. Davis would appear with him in *Sons of New Mexico* in 1949. Ultimately, she would appear in 15 movies with Autry and acted in more than 30 movies altogether.

In 1950, she made guest appearances on the popular programs *The Cisco Kid* and *The Lone Ranger*. She continued to appear in films and made numerous appearances on *The Gene Autry Show* with her mentor.

In 1954, Davis was set to star in the television series *Annie Oakley*. In the process, she became the first woman to portray the lead character in a television western. Her career in westerns and real-life ex-

pertise with a gun made Davis a natural match.

The real Annie Oakley, famous for her sharpshooting skills, performed for 17 years as part of *Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show* and died in 1926.

The television version, however, fictionalized her life, portraying the heroine as a crime-solver and a one-woman force for justice in the Old West. The show, produced by Gene Autry and co-starring Brad Johnson, ran from 1954 to 1957.

Davis was proud of her portrayal of Oakley and how the character doled out her own justice without killing. She remarked years later, "Annie Oakley had to deal with the same ruthless characters, rustlers and killers, that the cowboys dealt with. And she did it without ever killing a one of them."

In 1960, she was honored with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Davis would marry three times, divorcing twice. One of her later appearances included a 1961 episode of *The Andy Griffith Show*, but by the 1960s, her career had begun winding down. By the 1970s, she retired from acting completely.

Gail Davis died in 1997, but left behind many fans. In 2004, she was inducted into the National Cowgirl Museum and Hall of Fame in Fort Worth.
