Prepare for May 26

Primary Runoff Election

Voters across Tarrant County will return to the polls May 26 for the Texas Democratic and Republican primary runoff elections, with early voting scheduled for May 18-22.

According to Tarrant County Elections, early voting locations will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday during the early voting period.

Several state and local races remain undecided and will appear on runoff ballots for voters who participated in either the Democratic or Republican primary elections earlier this year. Voters who cast a ballot in a primary are required to vote in the same party's runoff, adversely voters who did not vote in a primary may choose to vote in either party's runoff.

Democratic runoff races in Tarrant County include lieutenant governor, attorney general, U.S. representative for District 24, state representative for District 97 and Tarrant County commissioner for Precinct 2.

Republican runoff races include U.S. senator, attorney general, railroad commissioner, U.S. representative for District 30 and judge for the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Place 3.

Election Day is Tuesday, May 26. Polls will be open throughout Tarrant County on Election Day, and voters may cast ballots at participating countywide polling locations.

Election officials remind voters that Texas law requires an approved form of photo identification to vote in person. Residents are encouraged to confirm their voter registration status, polling locations and sample ballots before heading to the polls.

River Oaks Reminds

Residents of Outside Storage Regulations

The River Oaks Code Enforcement Division is reminding residents about city regulations regarding outside storage of personal property as part of ongoing neighborhood maintenance efforts.

According to the city, Article 6.03, Property Maintenance, Division 3, "Outside Storage of Personal Property," specifically addresses prohibited outdoor storage under Section 6.03.061.

The ordinance is intended to help maintain safe, clean and attractive neighborhoods throughout the city. Prohibited outside storage may include items such as discarded appliances, vehicle parts, tires, construction materials, inoperable vehicles, lawn equipment and other miscellaneous items stored in yards or driveways.

City officials encourage residents to review the ordinance and ensure their properties remain in compliance with local regulations.

The Code Enforcement Division recently shared informational materials reminding property owners that proper maintenance and storage practices help protect property values and improve community appearance.

Code enforcement staff also encourage residents to regularly inspect their properties for items that may violate city ordinances and dispose of unwanted materials appropriately.

How to Donate Blood

Download the American Red Cross Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license, or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.

Volunteer Opportunities

Another way to support the lifesaving mission of the Red Cross is to become a volunteer blood donor ambassador at Red Cross blood drives. Blood donor ambassadors help greet, check in and thank blood donors to ensure they have a positive donation experience.

Entries Due June 7 for Texas Wildlife & Nature Photographer of the Year Contest

Time is running out to enter the Texas Wildlife & Nature Photographer of the Year contest. Photographers have until June 7 to submit their best work.

The contest is organized by Wildlife in Focus (WIF), a nonprofit conservation organization dedicated to preserve and protect native wildlife and their habitats in Texas. This is the first year WIF has offered a state-wide competition.

“Our mission has always been to use photography as a bridge to conservation,” said Miles Phillips, Photo Contest Director for Wildlife in Focus. “This new Photographer of the Year contest invites every Texan to tell the story of our state’s wildlife, from prairies and pineywoods to deserts and coastlines. When people pause to photograph the natural world, they begin to value it. And when they value it, they help protect it.”

The contest is open to all Texans, from seasoned photographers with professional equipment to backyard birdwatchers and young nature lovers capturing moments on a phone camera. With more than \$3,000 in cash prizes and recognition on a statewide stage, the competition aims to highlight both artistic excellence and ethical wildlife photography.

The submission window closes June 7, 2026. All entries must be photographed in Texas. The competition features both Adult and Youth divisions, with categories including:

- Birds of Texas
- Mammals of Texas
- Animal Behavior
- Texas Wildscapes

Adult category winners will receive \$500 each, with an additional \$500 grand prize awarded to the Overall Texas Wildlife & Nature Photographer of the Year. Youth winners will receive \$100 awards, and Highly Commended entries in both divisions will be recognized.

Youth entries (17 and under) are free to submit, while adult entries are \$10 per image. No preregistration is required.

All images must depict wild, free-ranging wildlife photographed ethically and truthfully in natural conditions. Wildlife in Focus maintains strict ethical guidelines

prohibiting harassment, baiting, or digital manipulation that alters reality.

An awards event will be held later this year at the Witte Museum in San Antonio. Winning images may be featured in *Wildlife in Focus* publications, exhibitions, and educational programming, helping inspire the next generation of conservationists.

Keep Roads Safe: Use These Tips to Stop Driving Distracted

Driving fatalities in the United States are at the highest point since 2008, yet new research reveals that many are unaware of the enhanced risk and are actively making choices that increase the danger on our roads.

According to a new survey from Travelers, 57% of people think roadway safety is unchanged since before the pandemic. At the same time, over a third of drivers have experienced a near-miss because they were distracted while driving.

Our devices are a large part of the problem. One-third of respondents believe it is acceptable to use technology while driving and even more admit to doing so, 79% say they have made or received a phone call while driving, 74% have looked at map directions on a cell phone and 56% have read a text message or email. A growing number of drivers are also taking to social media, with 29% admitting to recording videos or taking photos using their smartphone, a number that's increased since 2019 along with the rise of TikTok and other social media platforms.

"When you're behind the wheel, every second matters, and anything that occupies your mind or vision is a distraction," says Chris Hayes, assistant vice president of Transportation and Risk Control at Travelers. "While it's tempting to use your phone, especially when it's alerting you to texts and calls, doing so is dangerous to you, your passengers and others on the road."

To help put a stop to distracted driving, Travelers is offering the following tips:

- **Turn off notifications:** Setting your phone to "do not disturb" before you begin driving is a good idea, as it can help prevent you from being tempted to check your phone for new notifications.

- **Prepare beforehand:** Check directions or set your GPS before you begin driving. Put your favorite playlist or radio station on before you hit the road.

- **Let it wait:** Do not make calls, text or otherwise manipulate your phone while driving. Even hands-free calls can pull your focus from the road. If you need to text, email, make a call, or use your phone for any other reason, pull over first.

- **Recruit a passenger:** Rely on your passengers to handle technology-related tasks, such as checking GPS, changing the music or radio station, and answering calls or texts.

- **Speak up:** Consider asking a distracted driver to put down their device. Eighty-seven percent of consumers who use a phone while driving say they would be less likely to do so if a passenger spoke up.

- **Beware of other distractions:** It's important to make driving your number one priority when you're on the road, and keep in mind that not all distractions are tech-re-

lated. For example, don't wait until your commute to eat, brush your hair, or apply makeup. Take care of such tasks before you start the car.

"There are more distractions than ever on today's roadways. Ultimately, making a concerted effort to change behaviors will help prevent injuries and save lives," says Hayes.

Balloons vs. Nature

Whether you are having a party or you are honoring a loved one, it is never a good idea to release balloons. They might say eco-friendly but could take up to seven years to biodegrade.

Mylar balloons are composed of synthetic nylon with metallic coating. They are not biodegradable and can cause power outages or fires when they get twisted with electrical lines. When you release them it might look majestic and you might wonder how far it will go but where it really ends up is terrible.

Balloons, usually bright with color, attract wildlife and marine life and get easily mistaken for foliage or food. Devouring balloons can cause them their life, not to mention being tangled up in the balloon string can cause suffocation. Helium which fills the balloons is a finite source and we cannot manufacture it. Helium is used for fiber optics, infant breathing ventilators, and MRI's.

The next time you want to use this party staple remember the fatal consequences for wildlife and marine life. If you have to have balloons, weigh them down, pop them and properly dispose of them.
