Castleberry Lions Bound for State Playoffs After Dominant Senior Night Victory

CISD Student Earns Spot in All-State Mariachi Ensemble

Castleberry High School student, violinist, Steve Sánchez, has earned a place in the All-State Mariachi Ensemble and will be performing at the TMEA Conference alongside the top mariachi students in Texas!

This historic accomplishment marks a first for Castleberry ISD as Steve is the first student to achieve All-State Mariachi Honors. He has earned the tremendous distinction of being sixth chair in the entire state, representing the district and school at the highest level.



The Castleberry High School football team is on their way to the UIL 4A state playoffs. For the second consecutive year, Head Football Coach Juan Silva has guided the Lions to a playoff berth. This year, CHS finished in third place in District 6-4A in order to qualify for the playoffs. They concluded the 2025 regular season with a record of 6-4, 3-2 in district play.

The final district game was played Friday, Nov. 7 at W.O. Barnes Stadium. It was Senior Night – always an emotional night as many players, trainers, cheerleaders and band members celebrated their last football game at home against Life Waxahachie.

competitive all year and came into the game winless (0-9). Happily, for Lion fans, they left the same way. To the delight of the large home crowd, the Lions totally dominated the Mustangs and rolled to a 49-13 victory.

Offensively, Castleberry was amazingly balanced in their attack in this final regular season game. The Lions amassed over 400 yards of total offense. This total was almost split in half between running and throwing. CHS finished with 217 yards rushing and 209 yards passing. This is what most teams strive for, a balanced offense to keep the defense guessing on what to expect.

Senior quarterback Ethan Chappell completed 12 of 25 passes for 169 yards and four touchdowns. Junior wide receiver Bryan Cenicerros even completed a pass as well (his only attempt). His completion went to senior running back Jaydin Locks for 40 yards. Cenicerros had a fantastic night on the other end of most of Chappell's completions. He finished the night with eight receptions for 150 yards (18.8 yards/reception) and three touchdowns. He finished the regular season with 891 yards receiving and 15 touchdowns.

Meanwhile, senior running back Isaiah Ford capped off an outstanding regular season. He had 21 carries against the Mustangs for 219 yards which averaged out to a whopping 10.4 yards/rush. Which basically averages out to every time he carried the ball, he got a first down! Ford also accounted for three touchdowns as well. He finished the regular season with 1,543 yards rushing and 18 touchdowns.

Castleberry will enter the 2025 UIL 4A state playoffs with a 6-4 record. The Lions will be guaranteed to finish the 2025 season with a winning record. This will be the first winning record for CHS since 2019, when the Lions finished 7-4 in Coach Silva's first year as head football coach at Castleberry.

The Lions, as the third place finisher in District 6-4A will now play the second place team from District 5-4A, Decatur. The Eagles finished their regular season with an overall record of 6-3, 5-1 in district. It is worth noting that two of their three losses came at the hands of teams that went on to finish the regular season undefeated. They lost to Brock 52-31 in their first game of the season (Brock went on to finish 10-0). The Eagles lost their only district game to Springtown, 63-36 (Springtown also finished the regular season 10-0). The Eagles are averaging over 53 points per game. This is the result of a very balanced offense. They have two senior running backs that each average over 70 yards rushing per game. They also have two receivers that each average over 70 yards in receptions per game. CHS will need to slow down the Decatur offense and continue their own balanced offensive output as they did last week.

Lion fans take note: this playoff game will be played on Thursday, Nov. 13! The teams have agreed on playing at Birdville FAAC and kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m. (also a change from the accustomed time of 7:30 p.m.).

Come out and cheer our Lions on as they compete in the playoffs. GO LIONS!

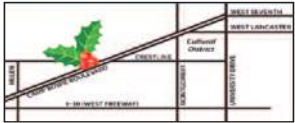

ORDINANCE NO. 1465-2025

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2, “ANIMAL CONTROL”, OF THE RIVER OAKS CODE OF ORDINANCES (2020) AS AMENDED; AMENDING THE REGULATIONS OF ANIMALS; ARTICLE 2.06 “MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS”; SECTION 2.06.005 “FEEDING STRAY OR FERAL ANIMALS” REVISING THE PROVISIONS REGARDING THE FEEDING OF STRAY OR FERAL ANIMALS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION IN THE OFFICIAL NEWSPAPER AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIVER OAKS, TEXAS:

SAVINGS

All rights and remedies of the City of River Oaks, Texas, are expressly saved as to any and all violations of the provisions of the Code of Ordinances of the City of River Oaks, Texas or any other ordinances affecting animal control, feeding of stray or feral animals which have accrued at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance; and, as to such accrued violations and all pending litigation, both civil and criminal, whether pending in court or not, under such ordinances same shall not be affected by this Ordinance but may be prosecuted until final disposition by the courts.

PENALTY

In accordance to Section 1.01.009, “General penalty for violations of code; continuing violations”, of the City of River Oaks Code of Ordinances (2020) as adopted and as amended; whenever in this code or in any ordinance of the city an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or whenever in such code or ordinance the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, and no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of this code or any such ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Each day any violation of this code or of any ordinance shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

PUBLICATION

The City Secretary is directed to publish in the official newspaper of the City, the caption, penalty clause, savings clause, publication clause and effective date clause of this ordinance one time as authorized by Chapter 5, Section 5.02(c) of the Charter of the City of River Oaks.

EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained.

State of Texas Announces New Services on Texas by Texas

The Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) is pleased to announce the availability of even more services on Texas by Texas (TxT), the State's official digital assistant. Provided by Texas.gov, TxT gives Texans an easy, convenient, and secure way to take care of multiple government services online via a single, personalized account, anytime, anywhere, and on any device.

“Since TxT’s public launch in 2022, more than 10.8 million Texans have created their TxT account and embraced the ease and convenience that TxT offers,” said Amanda Crawford, DIR Executive Director and State of Texas Chief Information Officer. “At DIR, we understand what a game changer TxT is for Texans in terms of time and cost savings that come from completing services online. And, in alignment with our mission to deliver effective, efficient digital government for the State, we’re excited to continue bringing even more agencies and services onto the TxT platform.”

In addition to existing services like driver's license/ID renewal, vehicle registration renewal, and massage therapy and instructor license renewal, new services now available on TxT include:

- Driver's license upgrade. Offered in collaboration with the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), Texans can upgrade from a learner license to a provisional driver license on TxT following the successful completion of their driving skills test with a participating driving school.

Notably, this brings a previously in-person only service online

and expands access to a new generation of Texans, allowing those 16-18 years old to create a limited-access TxT account and complete their driver's license upgrade.

- Boat registration renewal. Offered in collaboration with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD), Texans can link and manage boats on their TxT account, as well as renew boat registrations, order additional ID cards, and replace lost registration decals or ID cards.

This service welcomes a new state agency to the platform and enables the state's large boating community to enjoy the ease and convenience that TxT delivers.

In terms of ease and convenience, TxT currently has a 93 percent satisfaction rating among users and regularly receives positive feedback from Texans across the state.

The TxT platform was developed and is operated by Deloitte in collaboration with DIR and participating state agency stakeholders.

Lovett's Leadership Laid the Foundation for Rice University's Success



To accomplish great things, one must be willing to perform great work over a great span of time. Rice University in Houston, which has come to exemplify such glory, has in its century of life become one of the most respected universities in the nation. The college started from nothing, except for the dream and generous donation of its founder. It was the job of its first president, **Edgar Lovett**, to make that dream a reality. With years of hard work and determination, Lovett built the institution and set the direction for greatness for its students and the college itself.

Edgar Odell Lovett was born in 1871 in a small town in central Ohio. As he grew up, he had a solid education and steadily moved up the academic ladder. He received a degree from Bethany College in West Virginia in 1890 at the age of 19. From there, he moved into graduate studies. To help pay for graduate school, he taught at West Kentucky College. He graduated with a doctorate from the University of Virginia in 1895.

Enchanted by mathematics, he went to Germany and studied at the University of Leipzig, earning a second doctorate in 1896. He returned to the US, and steadily moved

from one institution to another as an instructor, including such prestigious institutions as the University of Chicago and Johns Hopkins University. He married in 1897, and the couple eventually had four children. In 1898, he was hired as a math professor at Princeton University. Eventually, he became chairman of the Department of Mathematics and Astronomy.

The family suffered a devastating loss in 1906 with the death of an infant daughter. In the meantime, a nationwide search was underway for the inaugural president for the new Rice Institute. Woodrow Wilson, the future President of the United States and the president of Princeton University from 1902 to 1910, recommended his old friend Lovett to the search committee.

Impressed by Lovett's credentials and Wilson's recommendation, the search committee extended an offer. Looking for a way for the family to start over, he accepted, and the family moved to Houston. Lovett assumed his new position in 1907.

Lovett faced a great challenge. He was president of a college that did not yet exist. He had to start from scratch. Businessman and benefactor William Marsh Rice had left a large fortune to start the college, but there was not yet even a location or a building for it. Lovett toured dozens of universities around the world to try to model the new institution.

He worked with architects on several building designs and plans for the future campus. He was determined that the new college would maintain the highest standards in education. With a location set, construction on the main administration building began in 1911. He set about hiring 10 professors in preparation for the opening. The ornate administration building was completed in fall 1912. A total of 77 students enrolled, including women, all of whom attended tuition-free thanks to the generous terms of the Rice endowment. The school was officially dedicated on Sept. 23, 1912.

The co-educational status was unusual for the time, but Lovett made sure that the

men's and women's dorms would be across campus from each other. Athletics were a tradition Lovett established immediately while he chose the blue and gray team colors. Students quickly adopted the owl as the mascot. At the first graduation ceremonies in 1916, some 36 students graduated, including one with a masters degree.

Elaborate plans for new buildings were developed. The student newspaper was established in 1916. In 1918, the college awarded its first doctorate, for math. The college grew, but because of limitations of the Rice endowment and the intention to keep quality as high as possible, freshman enrollment was capped at 450 in 1924. Competition for slots into the college was high, and tuition was still paid by Rice's bequest.

By 1941, Lovett considered retiring. However, World War II erupted, and he decided to stay and continue to guide Rice. The college became part of the navy's officer training program, a forerunner of ROTC. In 1945, he officially retired after leading the institution for nearly four decades.

He stayed in Houston after his retirement, keeping a careful interest in the university he helped build. Grateful for the work he had done, the university renamed the administration building after Lovett in 1947. He died in a Houston hospital in 1957.

Fort Worth Veterans Day Parade Honors Vietnam Veterans

More than 1000 spectators, veterans, community dignitaries and families gathered in downtown Fort Worth on Tuesday, Nov. 11, to honor America's service members during the city's annual Veterans Day parade.

Hosted by the Tarrant County Veterans Council (TCVC) in partnership with the City of Fort Worth, this year's parade carried the theme "Saluting Vietnam Veterans." Participants and spectators lined the streets under clear, sunny skies despite the chilly morning temperatures.

From the Tarrant County Sheriff's Office **Tarrant County Sheriff's Office Warns Residents of Ongoing Phone Scam**

The Tarrant County Sheriff's Office (TCSO) is warning residents about an ongoing phone scam involving callers impersonating sheriff's deputies and demanding money for fake fines or warrants.

According to the Sheriff's Office, scammers are contacting individuals and claiming they owe money for failing to appear in court, missing jury duty, or having an active warrant. Victims are urged to pay fines using wire transfers, gift cards, or payment apps such as Zelle or CashApp.

Officials emphasized that the calls may appear legitimate because scammers are using the names of actual TCSO employees and "spoofing" official phone numbers to make the calls seem authentic.

"The Tarrant County Sheriff's Office does not call and demand money over the phone," the agency said in a statement. "We will never ask for payment via gift cards, prepaid cards, or electronic payment apps."

Residents are urged to be skeptical of any unsolicited requests for money. Before taking action, TCSO recommends verifying the information by speaking with friends or family members or conducting an online search.

Anyone who believes they have been targeted should report the attempt to their local police department. Residents living in unincorporated areas of Tarrant County can contact TCSO Dispatch at 817-884-1213.

The Sheriff's Office is asking the public to share this warning, particularly with seniors and those without access to social media, to help prevent further scams.
