Senior Night Victory Falls Just Short

The final football game of the 2022 season for Castleberry and Carter Riverside was moved from Friday, Nov. 4 up to Thursday, Nov. 3 due to predicted severe weather on Friday. Castleberry entered the game 1-8 (1-5 in district). Carter Riverside had a 4-5 record but an identical 1-5 record in district play. Both teams' only district victory came against winless Diamond Hill. The Lions victory (37-0) came on Oct. 7 at Homecoming. Carter Riverside was just coming off their victory over Diamond Hill last week (56-14). The Lions took on the Eagles at W.O. Barnes Stadium. This was Senior Night and 17 seniors went through pre-game ceremonies with their families. After this, two evenly matched teams took the field. Two teams with disappointing district records hoping to end their season on at least a positive note – with a victory.

This was by far the closest and most exciting game of the year for the Lions. This game literally came down to the final seconds before the winner was determined. When the Lions failed to convert on fourth down with 31.8 seconds left in the game, their last chance to pull out the victory ended.

The Lions first possession began with a turnover when they fumbled on first down and the ball was recovered by the Eagles. This gave Carter Riverside great field position near mid-field. But senior Luke Fief (#33) tackled the Eagles quarterback for a 7-yard loss on first down and the Lions forced a punt three plays later.

Castleberry took over after the 51-yard Eagle punt on their own 8-yard line. The Lions marched the ball down the field. The drive was dominated by runs by senior Miguel Arroyo (#32), who finished the night with 29 carries for 160 yards. The 10-play, 92-yard drive ended with a 30-yard touchdown run by sophomore quarterback Demetrius Valadez (#7). Senior kicker

Diego Torres (#8) was good on his point-after-touchdown and with 5:51 left in the opening quarter the Lions led 7-0.

Carter Riverside quickly responded with a three play, 70-yard drive. Their star runningback, Jameer Muhammad (#3), who came in averaging over a 146 yards/game, ripped off a 63-yard touchdown run. The Lions had trouble stopping Muhammad all night as he finished with 24 carries for 275 yards. The Eagles point-after-touchdown tied the score 7-7 with 4:14 left in the first quarter.

The Lions got a big return of the ensuing Eagle kickoff by junior Alex Veliz (#9) of 54 yards. This set CHS up on the Carter Riverside 33-yard line. From there they took just three plays to score. Valadez (#7) got his second touchdown of the night on a 1-yard run. The Lions 2-point conversion failed but the Lions had regained the lead 13-7 at the 3:19 mark of the first quarter.

The Eagles again quickly responded. This time it was a five-play, 75-yard drive. A 21-yard touchdown run at the end of the first quarter (32.4 seconds left) tied the game at 13-13 (point-after-touchdown was missed). Carter Riverside then attempted an onside kick – but senior Daniel Jasso (#34) managed to pounce on the ball and keep the possession for the Lions. But CHS failed to move the ball and quickly found themselves facing a fourth-and-4 from their own 44-yard line. The Lions lined up to punt but failed to convert an attempted fake punt. Carter Riverside got the ball on the CHS 40-yard line. On their second play of this possession, the star Eagle running back got his third touchdown of the first half with a 26-yard run. The point-after-touchdown gave the Eagles a 20-13 lead with 10:04 in the second quarter.

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

failed and CHS got terrific field position at midfield (their own 46-yard line). They took just six plays to respond with another touchdown run by Valadez (#7), his third of the first half. However, the Lions missed the point-after-touchdown and left the Eagles ahead 20-19 (7:41/second). Both defenses stiffened up the remainder of the second quarter. Neither team scored in their last possessions before halftime. Carter Riverside entered halftime with the 20-19 lead.

The Eagles took the opening second half kickoff and went on an impressive 13 play, 75-yard drive. It ended with a two-yard touchdown run by their quarterback. Their point-after-touchdown was blocked by Veliz (#9). This kept the Lion deficit to just seven points as the Eagles now led 26-19 (4:37/third). This long drive consumed the majority of the third quarter. The Lions first possession of the third quarter came with just 4:30 left in the quarter. CHS struck back with a nine-play, 56-yard drive. It ended with Arroyo's (#32) two-yard touchdown run. Torres' (#8) point-after-touchdown tied the score 26-26 with 1:01 left in the third quarter. As close as this game had been up to this point it was fitting that they entered the fourth quarter tied.

Carter Riverside began their next possession near the end of the third quarter and eight plays later had driven 70 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. But their point-after-touchdown was partially blocked by junior Ismael Cecenas (#45) and missed to give the Eagles a 32-26 lead. But it left an opening for CHS to score and possibly win the game as there was still 9:06 left in the game.

The Lions took little time in moving the ball down to the Eagles 27-yard line. But after two five-yard penalties against the Lions they faced a first-and-20. The next play they coughed the ball up on a deep sack of their quarterback and was recovered by the Eagles. Carter Riverside was now in the driver's seat, with a six-point lead and the ball near midfield with about six minutes left in the game. They drove the ball down to the Lions 6-yard line and looked close to taking a two-score lead and putting the game away. But they committed a procedure penalty on third-and-5 to make it third-and-10 instead. Then junior Riley Bentley (#11) made a big tackle on an Eagle reverse to force fourth-and-4 from the 5-yard line. The Eagles chose to kick a field goal to indeed give them that two score lead. They made the field goal but were called for a holding penalty and had to rekick from 10 yards further back. This time the attempt fell short and was no good. The Lions still had life. They took over on their own 20-yard line with 3:03 left and all three timeouts. On fourth-and-8 from the 22, Valadez (#7) hit senior A.J. Silva (#3) for 11 yards and a first down.

The Lions got another first down on a scramble by Valadez

(#7). They then faced a second fourth down. This time they needed 13 yards for a first down. Valadez (#7) scrambled for 18 yards for the first down and 15 more yards were tacked on for a late hit penalty on the Eagles.

With 1:00 minute left in the game the Lions were on the Eagles 29-yard line, trailing by 6. They came to their third fourth down of this drive. Fourth-and-10 from the 29-yard line with 40.1 seconds left in the game and still had one time out. But the magic came to an end, sadly, as what appeared for a moment to be a touchdown pass reception in the endzone fell through the hands to the ground. The fans, who had jumped to their feet, about to erupt, came back to earth and sadly gasped and sat back down in their seats. Carter Riverside walked off the field with a 32-26 win.

Congratulations to Coach Silva and the other assistant coaches, staff, and players. And especially this year's seniors, who played their last football game for the Lions. You never gave up and played your hearts out. Go Lions!

Did You Know...? Veterans Day

- Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I.
- Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and Nov. 11 became a national holiday beginning in 1938.
- Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans, living or dead, and gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime.
- In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower officially changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.
- Every Veterans Day and Memorial Day, Arlington National Cemetery holds an annual memorial service. The cemetery is home to the graves of over 400,000 people, most of whom served in the military.

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Olympic Medalist, Texan Babe Didrickson Zaharias *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

Babe Didrickson Zaharias succeeded at nearly every sport she tried. The Texas native was a gifted athlete, becoming an Olympic medalist, champion golfer, and a celebrity along the way. She paved the way forward for women as professional athletes and became an inspiration for millions.



Mildred Ella Didrickson, affectionately known as “Babe,” was born in Port Arthur in 1911. She was the sixth of seven children in an active family.

Her father was a carpenter and a seaman while her mother was a gifted athlete herself, known for her skills as an ice skater. Didrickson’s parents and three eldest siblings had immigrated from Norway just a few years before.

As a young child, the family moved to Beaumont. She reportedly picked up the nickname “Babe” among her friends for how well she played baseball against other neighborhood kids, but it was also a nickname her mother had given her. At a young age, she showed tremendous athletic abilities in many different sports. In high school, she was an All-American basketball player and a track and field star.

She dropped out of high school her senior year to take a job with the Employers Casualty Insurance Company in Dallas, mostly to organize its semi-pro women’s basketball team, a team that won the Amateur Athletic Union national championship for 1931.

Didrickson qualified for the 1932 Olympics in Los Angeles. Competing against the best athletes in the world, she won three medals. She won gold medals for the javelin and the 80 meter hurdles. She took the silver medal for the women’s high jump.

After her success in the Olympics, she was a nationwide celebrity. She spent the next couple of years touring with a women’s exhibition basketball team. In 1934, she played in three exhibition baseball games, pitching for the Philadelphia Athletics, St. Louis Cardinals, and the minor-league New Orleans Pelicans. She was one of the first known women to play for a Major League Baseball team (a couple had played for minor league teams and semi-pro teams previously), even if for a spring training game. She still holds a women’s baseball throwing record.

She took up golf in 1935. She worked hard to master the game and competed in the Los Angeles Open, a professional golf event, in 1938. She was the only woman to compete in the event until the 1990s. Here, she met her future husband, George Zaharias, who was a professional wrestler and sports promoter.

With golf, the best women players were all amateurs, so to regain her amateur status, the United States Golf Association told

her she could not play any other sport for three years. Doing so, she regained her amateur status in 1942. The PGA Tour allowed her to play in several events in 1945 as an amateur in a season that saw many of its best players still fighting World War II, which was common for many sports. She played in three tournaments, making the cut for the final rounds for two events. She is still the only woman to make the cut and place in a PGA tournament.

She won the 1946 U. S. Women’s Amateur and the 1947 British Ladies Amateur. She attempted to qualify for the U. S. Open in 1948, but golf officials turned down her request, stating that the tournament was for men only. In 1949, she bought her own golf course outside of Tampa, Florida, living nearby for some time.

Frustrated with the limited opportunities for women athletes at the time, she co-founded the Ladies Professional Golf Association in 1950, and the same year, she won all three major championships for women. She would go on to win 41 LPGA tournaments between 1950 and 1956. She won the U. S. Women’s Open three times between 1950 and 1954. In 1953, she founded the Babe Zaharias Open in Beaumont, which became a regular LPGA event through the 1960s. Naturally, she won the first tournament.

She was popular with the press and the public alike. In 1950, the Associated Press named her as the best woman athlete of the first half of the twentieth century. In 1952, she had a cameo appearance in the Spencer Tracy and Katherine Hepburn comedy *Pat and Mike*.

In 1953, she was diagnosed with colon cancer, but she determined to survive and continue her athletic career. She had extensive surgery in 1954, and one month later, won the U. S. Women’s Open. She became an outspoken advocate for cancer awareness and research through the American Cancer Society. Cancer, unfortunately, was still very difficult to treat in the 1950s. The cancer returned, and she was not able to recover. She died in a Galveston hospital in September 1956 at the age of 45.

Years after her passing, she was still fondly remembered. In Beaumont, a public park was later named in her honor, and a museum dedicated to her life was opened. In 1974, the City of Tampa bought her golf course, now neglected and in disrepair, but rebuilt and reopened it as a public course renamed in her honor, one still operating today.

The post office issues a stamp in her honor in 1981. She was one of the first inductees into the Women’s Golf Hall of Fame in 1977 and named the Woman Athlete of the Century by the Associated Press in 1999.
