Lions Fall to Tigers on Military Appreciation Night

The weather Friday evening was beautiful at W.O. Barnes stadium for a high school football game. But the result did not turn out as one would have hoped for Castleberry. Not even a great home crowd could help CHS on this night. The Lions fell behind quickly and could find little rhythm offensively committing five turnovers. They eventually lost to the Glen Rose Tigers (2-1) 47-0.

The Lions won the coin toss and

deferred their choice to the second half, so Glen Rose began on offense. After the CHS kickoff sailed out of bounds, the Tigers began on their own 30-yard line. Nine plays later the drive ended with an 11-yard competition for a touchdown. The point-after-touchdown was good and Glen Rose led 7-0 with 9:47 left in the first quarter.

Castleberry responded with a 13-yard run for a first down by senior Juan Cano on their first play from scrimmage. However, the next three plays resulted in a loss of 11 yards and were forced to punt on fourth down. The Lions defense stepped up after this possession and forced the Tigers into a three-and-out. The Glen Rose punter did manage to get off an impressive 58-yard punt which (continued on page 4)

pinned Castleberry on their own 14-yard line. The Lions offensive series quickly ended when they threw an interception on a third-and-9 from their own 15-yard line. The Tigers scored three plays later on a 2-yard touchdown run. Glen Rose did miss the point-after-touchdown but still led 13-0 with 4:49 left in the first quarter.

Another interception thrown by Castleberry gave Glen Rose the ball near mid-field. They took one play to score. A 53-yard pass competition for a touchdown. Despite another failed point-after-touchdown, the Tigers increased their lead to 19-0 with 2:57 still left in the first quarter. The Lions' next possession resulted in yet another interception. However, this time the Lions defense got the ball back two plays later when junior Fernando Rodriguez recovered a Tiger fumble. The Lions could not move the ball and were forced to punt. Senior punter Jesse Salas got off a nice 45-yard punt from deep in his own end of the field. Unfortunately, the Tigers quickly scored after this on a 55-yard touchdown run on first down. The point-after-touchdown was good and the lead grew to 26-0 (10:59/2nd).

The Lions followed this with their best and longest drive of the game. They began on their own 19-yard line and drove the ball down to the Tigers 18-yard line. Most of the yardage in this drive was gained on runs by the Valadez brothers (freshman Demetrius and senior Anthony). However, after they drove to the Glen Rose 18-yard line the next two plays resulted in quarterback sacks. The impressive 15-play drive ended with no points scored when the Lions 4th down pass fell incomplete. When Glen Rose took over on downs they responded with their own long drive. However, theirs ended with another score. The Tigers 12-play, 65-yard drive ended just before halftime with a 5-yard touchdown run with just 19.9 seconds left. The point-after-touchdown made the score 33-0 at halftime.

The second half was not much better for our Lions. Their opening drive ended with another punt after gaining just one first down. Another nice 43-yard punt by Salas pinned Glen Rose on their own 16-yard line. On second-and-7 from the 19-yard line they broke loose on a 38-yard run. The very next play was a 43-yard pass competition for another touchdown. The point-after-touchdown put the Tigers up 40-0 (7:54/third).

Near the end of the third quarter, freshman linebacker Demonte Washington did pounce on a Glen Rose fumble to give the Lions the ball near midfield. However, CHS gave the ball right back to Glen Rose when they threw their fourth interception of the game two plays later. The Tigers then went on an eight-play drive which resulted in the last score of the night with a 5-yard touchdown run (6:49/fourth). The point-after-touchdown would make the final score 47-0.

The Lions (0-3), after a couple of tough games (both Godley and Glen Rose are very good teams that will be in the playoffs), are off next week. They will return to action on Friday, Sept. 24 when they travel to Kennedale to take on the Wildcats. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m. Go Lions!

Jimmy Allred, 33rd Governor of Texas *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

Gov. Jimmy Allred became governor of Texas in a desperate time for the state. The Great Depression created many hardships for families and crippled state finances. Though he had met with several defeats and reverses in his life, Allred's persistence guided Texas in a difficult time and cemented lasting changes.

James V. Allred, affectionately known as Jimmy to friends and family, was born in the small Montague County community of Bowie in 1899. His childhood was uneventful; he graduated from Bowie High School in 1917 and headed to Houston to enroll at Rice University. He ran out of money, which derailed his initial attempt at higher education, but he regrouped and pressed ahead.

The United States had entered World War I by this time, and Allred enlisted in the navy. After the war, he found a job as a law clerk in Wichita Falls. Inspired to resume his education, he enrolled at Cumberland University in Tennessee and received a law degree in 1921.

Allred returned to Wichita Falls and opened his own law firm. A respected attorney, Gov. Pat Neff appointed him as District Attorney for Archer, Wichita, and Young counties in 1923. Allred delighted in the role as a fighter for the common man, often taking on corrupt businesses and the Ku Klux Klan. He ran for attorney general, losing a close race in 1926. He rebounded, concentrated on his law firm and marrying Joe Betsy Miller of Wichita Falls in 1927, with whom he would have three children. Allred re-entered politics and became attorney general in 1930.

As the Great Depression deepened in Texas, Allred became increasingly popular for his actions taking on monopolies and corrupt business practices that hurt consumers and workers. As a result of his success, he ran for governor in 1934, seeking to replace the controversial Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson. In what became an unusual race for Texas, all three leading candidates for the Democratic nomination were from Wichita Falls: Allred, Tom F. Hunter, Charles McDonald. Allred came out on top and won the general election easily.

Allred made combating the Great Depression the focus of his administration. Unemployment was high, and farms were failing. He created the Texas Planning Board as an advisory commission to the state legislature to help determine how federal aid through President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal programs should best be utilized. Thousands of Texans were put to work through Works Progress Administration and Civilian Conservation Corps projects, building new parks, constructing schools and other public buildings, and paving streets and sidewalks. With these projects, the worst effects of the Depression were alleviated as many were able to put food on the table again.

He pushed through reforms to the state's Prohibition laws, allowing local-option alcohol elections.

He reorganized law enforcement in the state. He consolidated the Texas Rangers and the highway department into the

Department of Public Safety in 1936. Because of concerns over the issuing of pardons by previous governors, a constitutional amendment required all new pardon applications be reviewed by a special board first. The state also celebrated its centennial of independence in 1936 which included not only public observances, a welcome diversion during the Depression, but also the construction of monuments and museums across Texas. He also established the Interstate Oil Compact Commission to cooperate with other oil-producing states.

During his governorship, the family welcomed a new addition. In 1937, Joe Betsy Allred gave birth to a healthy son at the governor's mansion in the Sam Houston Bedroom in the Sam Houston bed. He was one of the few children born in the governor's mansion. Naturally, the son was christened Sam Houston Allred.

He had been stymied by the legislature in earlier attempts to establish a pension system for the elderly, but he pushed again after the Social Security Act was passed by Congress in 1935. In 1937, Allred enacted reforms to education, which included a pension for teachers and expanded funding for schools and students. New programs for the poor and elderly were also enacted, mostly paid for through new taxes on oil, gas, and liquor.

Allred was appointed a federal judge by President Roosevelt in 1938, a position he took after his second term as governor ended. He made one more attempt at office in 1942, resigning his position as federal judge to run for U.S. Senate in a losing bid against popular Gov. W. Lee "Pappy" O'Daniel.

In 1949, President Harry S. Truman re-appointed Allred to the federal bench, and the family moved to Corpus Christi. In 1959, Allred was presiding over a trial in Laredo when he halted the proceedings, complaining he was not feeling well. A few hours later, he collapsed and died at the age of 60.

His wife returned to Wichita Falls some years later, a respected, motherly figure in the community who lived a relatively quiet life until her passing in 1993. In 1995, the state opened a new prison, the James V. Allred Unit, between Wichita Falls and Iowa Park, naming it in the governor's honor.

REMEMBER

Watch out for students loading and unloading from school busses. It is illegal to pass a school bus actively loading or unloading passengers. Passing on either side of the school bus can lead to a fine anywhere from \$500 to \$1250 or more in Texas.

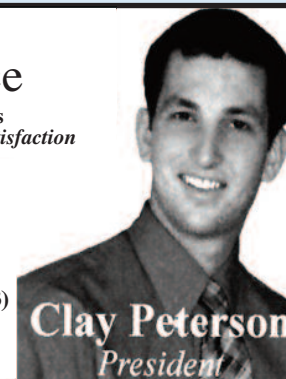
